Ostomy Pearls

In my job, I advise patients before and after ostomy surgery to help prepare them for this change in their body.

When talking to my patients before and after their surgeries, I often clarify information they have heard from their next door neighbor or the parishioner that sits beside them in church. One detail for example, is if you are going to be an ostomate with a diversion on your abdomen that releases stool, it should not have any effect on your urinary system. It is amazing the sign of relief on some of their faces! They may have also been misinformed. "I heard that they leak at least once a day; what do I do then?" I share information about customizing product fit and the help an ostomy nurse provides. Many ostomates have very good wear times and seals with their wafers, so can be assured that they can get back to their usual routines.

It is always good to point out resources that are available after a patient leaves the health care setting. They should develop a relationship with their WOC nurse and the clinic where they can make an appointment for any issues that they have.

Their surgeon may be able to help them, and they would always need to know how to contact them for other issues that may arise as well. They also can use the manufacturer's 1-800 number to talk with a clinician that may be able to offer suggestions over the phone. Manufacturers will often send a sample or two if they recommend a different pouch.

Patient Visiting and Support Services

Doctors and WOC Nurses, please note:

Upon request from a doctor, nurse, or social worker, a specially trained visitor will be asked to contact an ostomy patient by phone or visit them in person before and/or after surgery. The visitor will be matched as nearly as possible according to sex, age, and type of ostomy. The visitor does not give medical advice, and there is no charge for this service. Another resource is a support group...yes, a support group, where people can talk with and share some of their anxieties with other people who also wear a pouch! New ostomy patients need to know where their resources are, and how to contact them before they leave the hospital.

And lastly, "where do I pick up these bags?" is a common question. There is not a store in the mall. Can they buy them from Amazon? The answer is yes they can, but it would be an expense straight from the billfold with no reimbursement. I give them a list of product distributors and coordinating insurance benefits before they leave the hospital. The patient should have a schedule that the WOC nurse suggests and works out with the patient on the best schedule of changing the pouching system that will make

Disclosure

Think back to when you first got your stoma. Do you remember how you explained it to others? When it comes to the level of disclosure, everyone is different with what is comfortable. Here's advice that I hope will help:

When you're ready to share, start with people who care. Other ostomates and close family or friends can feel the safest.

Rehearse your explanation before disclosing to acquaintances or coworkers. Have a way to deflect intrusive questions such as,

"I don't really like talking too much about," or "Maybe I can explain more another time."

Start by asking whomever you're telling if they've ever heard of an ostomy. If they're unfamiliar you



may need to explain some basics first. However much you choose to disclose is completely up to you. However it happens, let that be okay knowing your confidence will grow with practice.

Baytown Group News

Baytown Ostomy Support Group met virtually with Carolina Torres-Williams, a supervisor with 16 years' experience. Carolina represented the Supervisory Transportation Security Office at George Bush Intercontinental Airport. Her presentation explained how travelers with support appliances are screened and so much more!

Carolina shared that the USA has 450 federalized airports where 50,000 TSA employees work to keep us safe when we travel. There are approximately 2 million travelers screened every day. In addition to our specific questions about travelling with support appliances, TSA has many programs that offer fantastic services such as TSA Notification Card, TSA Cares (a helpline to assist travelers with disabilities and medical conditions), TSA Pre ®, and assistance to Wounded Warriors. A "What to Expect" publication is updated regularly on their website which can prepare the traveler for screening and allow one to make informed decisions before arriving at the airport. Carolina reminded the group that should you have any concerns when you travel, ask to speak to a Supervisory Officer. Those on the call shared that they had not experienced difficulties with their screening process when they travelled. They found the TSA Notification Card to be helpful and the officers simply asked them to touch their pouch and then scanned their hands for explosive residue. 




Top Tips to Reduce the Risk of Ostomy Bag Leakage

Tip 1. Get the right type of ostomy skin barrier. THIS IS BASED ON WHAT YOUR STOMA LOOKS LIKE AND WHAT THE AREA AROUND YOUR STOMA IS LIKE.

The best pouching surface is one that is flat without creases or crevices. Many time you have to use products or different wafers to achieve this. SOOOOOO

What does your stoma look like?



Above are drawings of what your stoma might look like.

Many people have stoma's that don't stick out (protrude) of the abdomen too far. This can make pouching more complicated.

Remember the goal of the correct pouch is that your stoma output to flow into your ostomy pouch and not underneath or around the skin barrier.

With picture #1, 2, 3 the stomas do not stick out very far so you have an increased chance of the output going under the wafer. This will degrade the seal and cause leaking and possible skin irritation. These folks with probably use a CONVEX wafer. That is a wafer that has like a little bowl to it. These come in different types of firmness.

Pic #4 is probably the ideal stoma to have.

Pic #5 is referred to as a prolapsed stoma. We will not spend much time on this stoma/ It is distressing to see but contact me in you want more info. Usually happens more with colostomies.


Tip 2. Measure your stoma to get the right size for your skin barrier.

When you get your box of wafers, there should be a paper measuring guide. They may look different depending on your manufacturer. But it looks something like the image below.

REMEMBER: Every once in a while, you should remeasure your stoma. They can change in size and shape. This especially true in the first few weeks after creation. There is swelling that will usually subside making your stoma smaller than when it was first created.



Measure 12-6 and 3-9. Turn your wafer over and mark a spot at 12 and 6 and one for 3-9. Then carefully join the dots together. Sometimes your stoma will be perfectly round. That doesn't always happen. Sometime your width will be longer than the height. So, your stoma looks more oval. You just need to get measure twice and cut once. Don't worry if you mess up, everyone usually wastes a wafer or two.

good use of the number of pouches they can receive in a month. As clinicians, we never know everything and have learned a lot of what we do know from the patients we care for. Making them feel ready to manage their ostomies themselves is a challenge, but each day at a time is an important way to look at the effective management.

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
