### Visitor Training: Be the One to Make a Difference

I could hear the fear and anxiety in her voice as she told me about an embarrassing incident that had occurred in one of her first ventures out since her recent ostomy surgery. I listened as she told me of her frustrations and fears. First, I assured her that her experience was not unique. I had a few incidents at first and explained that it got better as one becomes more adept at managing and/or perhaps making a change to a better pouching system. I began to ask questions to help her figure out if a WOC nurse visit might help or if there were other simple strategies that could help, such as changing more frequently or emptying before the pouch becomes overly full. As we talked, I could hear the anxiety and stress begin to leave her voice as we discussed her concerns and how to address them. Just the fact that I related to her situation and that I had overcome my own startup issues gave her hope. For many of us, just finding someone who understands and empathizes with our concerns is such a relief. Further, meeting with ostomates, sharing problem-solving techniques, and matterof-fact advice can make a major difference.

This is exactly why our Visitor Training program is so important. Our mission is providing mutual support for people with a colostomy, ileostomy, urostomy, and J-pouch. We help ourselves by helping others to help themselves. As part of our charter with the national group, the UOAA, we train our members to be Ostomy Visitors. We try to match the new ostomate with a person of the same gender, similar age group, and surgery type. Our

Upon request from a doctor, nurse, or social worker, a specially trained visitor will be asked to contact an ostomy patient by phone or visit them in person before and/or after surgery. The visitor will be matched as nearly as possible according to sex, age, and type of ostomy. The visitor does not give medical advice, and there is no charge for this service. visitors have met with people from ages as young as 3 months to 90+. There is only one way for our Visitor Training program to be successful. We must have as many ostomates as possible taking our Visitor Training. Please be the match for someone like you! Most people facing ostomy surgery have never known anyone else with an ostomy. I think we all remember how encouraging and reassuring it was to meet someone who had had the surgery and was living their life, traveling, working, and playing. Once certified as a Visitor, you will have the tools to say the right thing and the knowledge to know what not to say which can be just as important. Currently, most of our visits take place on the phone or in one of our virtual or in-person support group meetings. Attending our meetings (virtually or in person) also keeps our members current on the latest ostomy products and local news.

We attempted to hold our bi-annual Visitor Training in 2021. However, shockingly not one person signed up for the program. We assume that this is due to the pandemic. Nevertheless, the Board still is fielding many phone calls and inquiries on our

#### **Ostomy Apps**

The question has come up from new ostomates if there are any smart phone apps to help manage life. It turns out there are smart phone apps to help. And most of them are FREE!!!

#### Ostomy 101 by Ostomy 101 Inc.

Support and information for living confidently with an ostomy. It is a nonprofit, vendor neutral app to provide access to the tools, information and resources for successfully living with an ostomy. The app provides consults with a certified ostomy nurse, connect to a patient coach and find helpful ostomy education and resources. This is the only app endorsed by UOAA. Dawnette Meredith, the designer of the app, was able to join the group from San Diego and was able to share some of the highlights from the app.

#### Me+ Ostomy Care by Convatec

This app is directed at patients/caregivers, and healthcare providers. Information about ostomies from pre-op to post op and beyond. Community chat with other ostomates and resources specific to stoma type. Product options and videos are also available.

#### OstoBuddy by The Ostomy Companion by Buddha Technologies

OstoBuddy is your ostomy companion and helps you navigate life with an ostomy. Designed and used every day by a fellow ostomate. This app helps you to manage your supplies, keep track of your usage, reminds you to change, and helps you keep track of your ostomy output.

#### Stoma Steps by Eakin Healthcare Development Team

Helps you prepare for your surgery and then adjusting to life with a stoma. Provides you support and information in small bites with encouragement and advice. Tools to help you communicate with your ostomy nurse, practical notes on fluids intake, sleep and how you are feeling. Has stress and anxiety coaching, community chat with other ostomates and tips for stoma care and management.

#### WHAT IS THE VISITOR TRAINING PROGRAM?

The Visitor Training program happens every other year at the local level for the purpose of creating a group of people who are of a variety of ages, backgrounds, and surgery types who can be called upon to talk with new ostomates.

The objectives of the training include:

- To understand the purpose of the Visitor Program
- To learn the role and responsibilities of a visitor and basic visiting policies
- To review the anatomy and physiology of intestinal and urinary diversions
- To recognize psycho-social issues of individuals with diversionary surgeries

Typically, the program is divided up into four sessions:

Segment # 1 - Basic Visiting Policies and Procedures Segment # 2 - Ostomy 101 (Anatomy and Physiology) Segment # 3 - Psychological and Social Issues Segment # 4 - Visiting Skills

We always leave time for questions and discussion. Evaluations we have received in the past have always rated our program very favorably. We are currently planning to have a virtual Visitor Training program on Saturday, July 23rd, 2022. Please save the date and plan to join us!


## A QUICK GUIDE TO UROSTOMY BASICS

Have questions about a urostomy? Worried that getting one will change your life dramatically? Terrified of the idea of one and wondering what people will think?

Don't worry. These are normal feelings. Nobody likes the idea of getting a urostomy – at first. However, if you talk to people who've had one a while, they'll tell you how much it's improved their lives, and likely saved it.

So feeling a little apprehensive (or a lot) is completely expected. But getting a urostomy should not hold you back from living the life you've always wanted. Will it change your life? Yes, but likely for the better compared to past bladder issues.



#### What Is A Urostomy?

A urostomy allows urine to leave the body without the need of a bladder. Also known as an ileal conduit, it is a surgically-created pathway that channels urine through the intestine to an opening on the abdomen. This opening, known as a stoma, is covered by an external pouching system that collects the liquid.

#### Why Do People Need A Urostomy?

People need a urostomy because their bladder has either been removed or doesn't function properly. This is most often due to bladder cancer, but can also be the result of an injury or disease. In other cases, people are born with a non-functioning bladder and benefit from a urostomy their entire lives.

#### Is A Urostomy Gross?

No. Not at all. They do not cause an odor, and most people won't even know if someone has one. Getting a urostomy is often a life-saving procedure that allows people to resume their everyday lives. Most people find it much easier and more sanitary to have a urostomy than deal with an incontinent bladder.

#### Will A Urostomy Affect My Daily Life?

There will be some adjustments after surgery, but most people who get a urostomy can usually do more things than they could before. You won't need to worry about the embarrassment of having an accident in public or always needing to know where the nearest bathroom is. But most of all, you'll be able to live a longer and healthier life.

#### Is A Urostomy The Same As A Colostomy?

While they share similar mechanisms in how they function, a urostomy helps people with bladder incontinence. A colostomy helps people with stool incontinence. Both use a pouching system to collect what comes out, and both are sanitary and safe without any odor when closed. Urostomy pouches have a tap or valve to allow the urine to be drained quickly and easily. Overnight options are available for nighttime drainage convenience.

#### How Many People Have A Urostomy?

You are not alone. An estimated 725,000 to one million people in the United States have an ostomy or continent diversion. Colostomy and ileostomy surgery are the most common ostomy types but many thousands of people of all ages and backgrounds have a urostomy or urinary diversion. For a bit of inspiration read a few of their patient stories on our blog.

#### How Will A Urostomy Change My Diet?

You can eat whatever you want when you have a urostomy. Of course, this is barring specific restrictions from your doctor or other dietary limitations unrelated to having a urostomy. But, in general, there are no restrictions to what you can eat with a urostomy but information on the importance of hydration and other good health practices are covered in our ostomy nutrition guide.

#### What Is A Continent Urostomy?

A continent urostomy involves a surgically formed internal reservoir that allows control of when urine is released from the body. It usually involves a catheter that's inserted into the stoma. Continent urostomies can also be routed through the urethra so urine is released from the body in a more typical fashion. Check out our Continent Urostomy Guide for more information.

#### **Does A Urostomy Decrease Life Expectancy?**

The answer is no. Urostomy surgery is a way to help people live longer and more fulfilled lives. So if you've been told you need a urostomy, as much as you might not think so right now, you'll probably be glad you had it.

These are probably just a few questions you have about a urostomy. Luckily, there are people all over the world happy to help you. First of all, your Wound, Ostomy, and Continence (WOC) nurse is there to teach and help you. But practical advice and emotional support are always just a click away in online communities and by finding a UOAA Affiliated Support Group near you. Just remember that only your doctor and WOC nurse know the unique circumstances of your condition.



(UOAA) is committed to providing resources to those who are in need of emotional support as well as promoting recommended standards of care across the nation that is supportive of both the physical and emotional well-being of people living with an ostomy or continent diversion.



Important research findings<sup>1</sup> show evidence that a high percentage of patients **did not** receive these recommended standards of care as outlined within the Ostomy and Continent Diversion Patient Bill of Rights<sup>2</sup>.




