Sugar Land Group News

The Houston Methodist Ostomy Support Group met Thursday, June 17, 2021, at 6:00 p.m. Our presenter, Tony Hall, with PPS Health Care, introduced the group to the wonders of silicone based ostomy products.

The first products were the Silvex[®], a convex seal and the Siltac[®], a flat seal. Both are made of silicone and are designed to stretch to fit around the stoma and then snug up to the stoma. Both products retain a rounded shape that help seal the stoma from leaking fluids under the wafer. The silicone helps to wick moisture from the skin upwards, keeping the skin free of moisture that can cause irritation.

Wipes were presented using the Elite[®] wipes or spray to gently help remove stoma bags and then use Elisse[®] wipes or spray to help your appliance stick to the skin while providing a soothing sensation to the skin. Tony mentioned that the silicone based spray also helps with itching. Joan shared that the spray and wipes dry very fast, so be aware no need to reapply, it is there where you put it!

Next was the Silken[®] silicone gel that can be placed directly around the stoma. It's liquid formula is easy to apply and conforms to the surface of the skin. No need to wait for the gel to firm up, just apply your appliance as usual. The gel does firm up over a period of 2-3 hours, this moves with you. When it is time to change your bag, it lifts off with no pieces left behind. Just remember less is more when applying—only a thin ribbon of gel is needed.

Silex[®] silicone flange extender is a THIN thin strip that replaces those hydrocolloidal elastic barrier strips. The application is made easy with a "1" on one side that you remove. Then position the flange extender against the edge of your wafer and remove the "2" strips and smooth over the skin. It is almost transparent and is waterproof to help with any water activities you may enjoy.

Finally, we learned about the only non-silicone product from Trios Ostomy the Trio Pearls®—a sachet to drop into a stoma bag to help gel the liquid stool with ileostomy output. Tony also announced that at the next Ostomy Nurse Conference they will be introducing the Genii®—a silicone ostomy appliance.

Questions included about what supply companies carry Trio Products. Edgebrook and Byrum both carry Trio products, but Tony noted that PPS Healthcare is also set up to help with getting stoma supplies. PPS Healthcare can be reached at 1-877-400-1700 or <u>https://trioostomycare.us/</u> where supplies can be ordered online.

Joan thanked Tony for the samples that were sent to many of the attendees and for his time.

Joan announced the Central OAHA group will be meeting in person on Monday, June 21st at the Tracy Gee Center.

The Houston Methodist Sugar Land Ostomy Support Group will meet again on July 15th at 6:00 p.m. Topic will be on output from stomas and what to expect. Joan stated that we will continue Virtual Meetings until further notice. Everyone thanked for joining and the meeting was adjourned at 7:00 p.m.

Baytown Group News

Baytown Ostomy Support Group was so fortunate to have Crystal Luna-Anderson RN, BSN, CWON (Certified Wound Ostomy Nurse), CFCN (Certified Foot Care Nurse) Ostomy Clinical Consultant for Coloplast as a presenter for our meeting on Monday June 21st. We tackled a Teams Meeting this time and had 7 enthusiastic individuals join in! Crystal led a great session introducing a concept to help minimize leakage: Apply > Remove > Check. For some, excessive hair growth in the area where the wafer needs to adhere can cause a problem. With hair removal, care should be taken to avoid folliculitis (inflammation of hair follicles). This can be done by warming the hair prior to removal and using an electric razor. The "Check" component of this 3 part concept was not a difficult one for this group. Many in the group agreed that they routinely look at the barrier when it is removed and assess it for erosion, evidence of bleeding and wear time. Crystal noted that the back of the wafer is your "road map". This gives you an idea about whether you are going down the right path.

A concept that will benefit all ostomates is to understand that peristomal skin irritation is NOT normal. The group shared some of their ideas for removal. Push-Pull technique is always a good idea. There were some interesting finds here basically warm water can always be used. Many used the releasers that are on the market as well.

Remember that stomas change. It is a good idea to measure the size periodically (a measurement guide is provided in each box of wafers). Coloplast has many resources available to us. "Guide to Healthy Skin", "Pouch Change Diary" and "Hernia Action Plan" are just a few of these wonderful resources you will find at: www.Ostomy.ColoplastCare.Us

Baytown Ostomy Support Group will continue to meet monthly. We would love to have you join us. Our next meeting is scheduled for July 19th at 6:00 p.m. and we have Edgepark scheduled to present.





Managing Your Ostomy Alongside Crohn's Disease Courtesy of ostomy.org

Managing an ostomy after Crohn's disease-related surgery may take some time, but don't get discouraged. Request an ostomy nurse to help you address issues, such as drains in surgical sites and other skin issues. Initially, it may be difficult to get a good pouching system seal on the stoma site, though many of these issues can be remedied with the help of an ostomy nurse

Below are some of the issues that could present along with resources you can refer to for more information:

PERISTOMAL SKIN CONDITIONS

These are usually benign and can be managed with some stoma powder or paste as recommended by your ostomy nurse.

- Occasionally, Crohn's disease-related complications may develop on or around the stoma, including, fistula, hidradenitis suppurativa or pyoderma gangrenosum (skin conditions that may be related to Crohn's disease).
- These may require more complex Crohn's disease management with your gastroenterologist, colorectal surgeon and/or dermatologist.

BOWEL OBSTRUCTION

A Bowel Obstruction, also known as an intestinal blockage, is a blockage that keeps food or liquid from passing through your small intestine or large intestine (colon).

Signs and symptoms of intestinal obstruction include:

- Abdominal pain
- Loss of appetite

- Constipation
- Vomiting
- Inability to have a bowel movement or pass gas
- Swelling of the abdomen

With Crohn's disease, intestinal obstructions can be caused by inflammation, adhesions (scar tissue), and strictures, which can cause the intestine to narrow.

PARASTOMAL HERNIA

A Parastomal Hernia occurs when the intestines press outward near the stoma site, creating a rip/tear in muscle tissue and causing a portion of the abdomen to bulge under the skin. This can sometimes result in pain, discomfort, or leakage on or around the ostomy site. A hernia may or may not require additional surgery, depending on how large and uncomfortable it may be. Hernia belts can be worn to protect the hernia site and prevent further damage from occurring.

PROLAPSE OF THE STOMA

A Prolapse of the Stoma can result in abnormal, visible external lengthening of the stoma after surgery. Prolapses, when severe, can result in a color change of the stoma due to diminishing blood supply, as well as constipation from bowel obstructions at the stoma site. Small prolapses are generally benign, but some require careful monitoring by your colorectal surgeon to see if it may become necessary to revise the stoma.
