March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

Colorectal Cancer Awareness? What does this mean? This means that if you love someone, you educate and encourage them to seek a routine diagnostic procedure that could save their life.

A colonoscopy. A routine colonoscopy is recommended beginning at age 45 or when other symptoms are present as recommended by a physician.

Colorectal cancer is the most treatable form of cancer—if caught early. Symptoms include frequent urges to go to the bathroom, diarrhea, blood in the stool and other un-natural bowel behaviors. Often times



we don't want to do 'potty talk', it's embarrassing. A long time ago people thought the same way about breast and prostate cancer. Now these diseases are featured everywhere and the survival rate is increasing. It is colorectal cancer's turn. Support someone you love and have a little potty talk.

I am often amazed at the attitude of friends and family when a colonoscopy is mentioned. Usually they balk and justify not having it done. I often share at this point that colon cancer is the most treatable—if detected early and the most fatal if not.

Sugar Land Group News

The meeting started with introductions and Joan welcomed Billy, Beth, Jacki, Carol, Nathaniel, Kathy, Sarah, and Daniela.

Courtney Chipokas from Byrum Healthcare brought Brandon Fawcett, an insurance specialist for ostomy durable medical equipment. Brandon spoke to the Medicare coverage for traditional Medicare and then Medicare Advantage plans. Basically, Medicare covers 80%, leaving you to pick up the 20% or have billed to the supplemental insurance coverage if you have it. If you must pay cash, Byrum is able to offer lower prices as they do supplies for many hospital systems across the US. Byrum can lower prices more with a 40-60% discount for cash pay patients. They can also set up payment plans. Courtney shared how now they can get a lifetime coverage for ostomy supplies, meaning once you start services with them, they will take care of getting renewed orders and changed prescriptions. The only call being made on your part is you calling Byrum to start service.

Questions were asked about how many bags are covered per month on average (20 for drainable and 60 for non-drainable).

Sarah and Daniela asked about coverage for wound collection devices for fistulas—consensus is not covered but Courtney will get back with group on that. Kathleen asked about insurance plans accepted and advised to call Byrum at 1-877-90BYRAM (1-877-902-9726) to get more information. Beth shared how she switched to Byrum and the seamless process with supplies delivered within a few days after the new year.

Discussion wandered to how to mask odor and decrease stink. Suggestions included lubricating deodorant, a tic-tac mint, rinsing bag with combination water and mouthwash (Listerine), spraying your bag with Poopouri, or using a bag without a filter. Joan mentioned if using a bag without a filter, you will need to 'burp' the bag (preferably in a restroom) to release the gas. Be sure to use a good room deodorizer like M-9TM or OziumTM (found near automotive supplies). Joan shared upcoming meeting on nutrition in March and 'Stinky Poo and Pee–the Art of Odor Containment' in April.

Our next meeting will be on Thursday, March 17th at 6:00 p.m., virtually, our topic will be Nutrition for the Ostomate.

Hear from our Certified Visitors

It sometimes can be hard to explain why ostomates should take time from their busy schedules to spend some time attending our Visitor Training Program. I thought it would be nice if you heard from some of our visitors themselves:

From Ed Wood: Since I had someone to help me with my early questions about my ostomy, I have valued being a certified visitor to payback my early personal experience.

From Allison Rosen: Helping someone who recently had ostomy surgery is life changing, for me as well as the patient. It helps me feel fufilled as an ostomate and helps the patient realize that they are not alone and have support every step of the way.

From Kathleen Duplessis: When I was a new ostomate, my quality of life greatly improved after visiting and talking with others living with an ostomy.

From Marian Newman: It is so rewarding knowing that you have made a difference in the life of an ostomate.

From Lorette Bauarschi: I have always felt that it was a moral obligation for me to help others who are going through what I went through with my illness and surgery. I have always been a problem solver, and if I am uniquely qualified to help someone, I want to help.

From Terry Marriott: I help ostomates because when I was a new ostomate, it helped me to see someone else with an ostomy. It makes them feel better about what they are going through.

From Denise Parsons: Once I had my surgery, I was grateful to the members at the meeting who eased my fears, and by their examples, let me know that I had no limits. Concerns that I had about traveling were resolved with common sense advice. Knowing that others had gone onto exciting and full lives was critical to my adjustment. It is important to me to be the person who gives others that same hope and practical tips for living their best life. I know that I have made a difference.

Barrier Considerations to Obtain Your Fit

What is more important: fit, flexibility, stretch capability, or adhesion?

If you cannot decide, or there are two or more that are just as important, you are not wrong. Why not have all in one for your barrier selection? You can have fit, flexibility, stretch capability, and adhesion in one pouching system!

Fit

When selecting a barrier, many considerations can come into play. When considering fit, proper application and sizing is important to help reduce leakage and create a seal around the stoma. Utilizing a stoma measuring guide or template with each pouch change is beneficial to help obtain the proper fit. Stoma size can change after surgery, so measuring is key. Deciding between a precut or a cut-to-fit barrier is also important to consider, as it depends on which option provides the best fit to your body.

Flexibility

A flexible barrier will move, bend, and stretch with your body allowing you to be comfortable as you go about your daily activities. Flexibility with stability helps achieve a seal around the stoma along with the proper fit. In day-to-day movements like, getting in and out of your car, vacuuming, getting a spice off the top shelf, or even a sport you enjoy playing, flexibility is important to move with your body.

Stretch capability

Can you have flexibility without stretch capability and vice versa? What if these two worked hand in hand to create the best seal and optimal comfort to help you with your daily activities? Think back to reaching to get a spice off the top shelf in the kitchen. You need to have flexibility in the barrier to obtain the stretch, but then when back in a normal standing position the ability for the barrier to go back to the original shape after completing the stretch—how is that obtained? Teamwork!

Adhesion

Lastly the ability for the barrier to have adhesion to the skin. This can be a challenge outside of the barrier itself. For example, what if there is a small area of irritation, moisture, or the landscape is not perfectly flat (which is very common)? The adhesion is important to provide the tact to the skin so that the barrier has all the capabilities: fit, flexibility and stretch! Good adhesive security is obtained by gentle warmth using the body heat of your hands, and a nice gentle pressure with application from the inside (near the stoma) all the way to the edges of the barrier. This helps

activate the adhesive into those small nooks and crannies that our skin has even if we can't see them with the naked eye.

Essentially, there are many questions that may come up when deciding on the best barrier fit for you. Let's go back to the original question that was posed: What is more important: fit, flexibility, stretch capability, or adhesion? The answer can be any of the above, and it all depends on your own lifestyle and personal needs. Things to keep in mind when you are considering your barrier options are, "Does this barrier have a good fit to my body?", "Does the barrier allow me to stretch without compromising the seal?", and lastly, "Does this barrier give me the security to enjoy my activities?". There are options available for many body types and challenges. Reach out to your WOC nurse so they can help you answer the questions that are important to you!



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
